<u>Cash Bingo</u>



The comments from those who have stood and admired the sign have been most positive.



Peter Johnson whose painting skills has revived the main picture depicting life in Ovington, Tony Watson for remounting the support column and planting up the flower bed, Paul Clark for restoring the scrolled metal work supporting the sign, and all those sturdy lads who re-erected the post and hefted aloft the heavy sign.

It is twenty years since the sign was first erected amid great ceremony and celebration and it is felt that a repeat of that occasion would be appropriate, so the Rev Jane Atkins has proposed a re-dedication ceremony later in the year, possibly coinciding with the harvest celebrations. Ovington tradition dictates that this be accompanied by a bun fight, with emphasis on the bun, so watch this space. Once again many thanks to those mentioned above for their sterling work.
