West Norfolk Aviation Society

At the August meeting, Peter Gunn author, historian, publisher and a founder member of the WNAS. was introduced by Rod Rumsby. His talk was entitled 'Barnstormers and Circus Fliers'. Norfolk was at the forefront of early aviation with a balloon flight at Norwich in 1785 and many attempts at man made flight.

Norfolk saw increasing aircraft activity during The First World War both Royal Naval Air Service and Royal Flying Corp operating from improvised airfields around the east and north Norfolk coast, in response to mounting attacks by German Airships.

With the end of hostilities, the newly formed Royal Airforce, carried out a reduction in both pilots and aircraft. The availability of cheap aircraft and unemployed pilots saw the creation of many, what the Americans' termed, Barnstormers and the Flying Circus, these attracted crowds numbered in thousands. The most famous was Alan Cobham's, (later Sir Alan Cobham) who apart from stunt and display flying, offered the public the opportunity to take a short flight for a modest fee. Alan Cobham went on to survey air routes to southern Africa, India and Australia and to pioneer In-flight Refuelling.

Logic Puzzles (solutions over page, so no peeking):

- 1. How many steps are required to break a bar of chocolate with R rows and C columns into individual squares? You may only break along row and column boundaries and no stacking pieces together.
- 2. Three boxes contain fruit, but all have been incorrectly labelled. The boxes are labelled "apples", "pears" and "apples & pears". You may choose one fruit from one box then must correctly identify all three boxes.
- 3. You have ten pound coins in your purse and ten friends, feeling particularly generous you decide to give each friend a pound coin. After a while you check in the purse and find a pound coin remaining, why?

Logic puzzle solutions **don't read** before trying the questions on previous page:

- 1. **Chocolate Bar:** Each time you make a break you turn 1 piece into 2, thus adding just one piece for each break made. So it needs the number of squares (RxC) minus 1 to break it into individual squares. The 'minus one' is because you did not need any breaks to get the first piece as this is the whole bar.
- 2. Fruit boxes: take a fruit from the "apples & pears" box. Since the label is wrong it must contain either all apples or all pears. Swap the 'apples & pears' label with the label from the fruit you chose (eat the fruit it's good for you). One box still has its original label so must be wrong, therefore swap the labels from the boxes you did not originally pick.
- 3. **Coins:** You gave 9 friends a pound coin and the tenth friend your purse containing a pound coin.
