Parish Council

Report from the unconfirmed minutes of the 16th January meeting:

Matters arising from previous meeting:

We were informed that a mirror at the cross-roads would not be permitted. A request has been set for a County Highways engineer to meet us on site to view the problem.

The hedge along the playing field has been cut, councillors were pleased with the work.

We received formal confirmation that the village has adopted the phone box and we look forward to the installation of the defibrillator.

Road Safety:

Work on the trod has begun, slightly delayed when a lorry crashed adjacent to the works – but the accident proves the need!

With the demise of the speed sign and the County Council withdrawing it from service the Clerk has come up with an alternative solution. It was agreed to purchase a share in our own vehicle activated sign in partnership with 5 other parishes and operate it on a rotor basis. The cost is £292 which includes initial maintenance.

In view of a number of near misses between pedestrians and cars the Council is proposing to make available reflective wrist bands and reflective clips which could be fixed to school bags. This will formally be discussed at next meeting, but in the mean time anyone who would like one please contact Karen:07735 205990

Precept:

After much discussion the council set the Ovington precept at \pounds 3740, which is an inflation rise only. However, because of the way Breckland Council calculate the tax base and the fact they that are withholding council tax support the actual rise in bills will be noticeably above inflation. That said, the Parish contribution to

overall council tax is only a tiny component. Councillors were displeased that external changes beyond our control have had such a significant effect.

St John's Heritage Lottery Fund Bid

Thank you to all who replied to the Heritage Lottery survey in the October edition of the Oracle. Some 31 households returned the forms and we are delighted with the response.

The following figures show there has been a substantial response to nearly all the questions asked and a broad coverage of interest.

As a result of the survey please see the 'Church' report by Revd. Jane for revised service dates and times, beginning in February.

Application to the Heritage Lottery Fund

An initial submission to the HLF team was made in November, to see if we had a good chance of our bid proceeding. We applied for initial funding of $\pm 160,000$ to meet the urgent repairs to the church

building that had been identified by the architect; and around $\pounds 30,000$ to meet the community aspects of the HLF requirements. (You may have seen a cherry picker in use at the church to inspect the tower roof, where some slates were replaced as part of this inspection). It is likely that we would need to find about $\pounds 10,000$ of this either in money or resource, to support the application.

The community aspects might include researching the church history; development and staging of an exhibition to record the work done; publishing a brochure or series of brochures to record the project. This may include regular updates to the village website to show progress; involvement of local schools to develop awareness of the heritage we have in this church; recording the trees, plants and wildlife in the churchyard; updating of the burial register; discovering any notable graves and the history behind those people (Apparently we have an admiral buried in the churchyard and there is some mystery about two servicemen who may have been interred there during the first World War). We also need to consider how best the church can be used for more than services – maybe for recitals and or concerts (we already have at least two offers to do this) – to extend its usage by the local community.

The result of the pre-qualifying application

The good news from the HLF team in Cambridge is that we can proceed to the next stage of the bidding process. Submissions for this are to be in by 28th February (for a decision by the end of June 2014).

We are still competing for funding with everyone else that had applied for funding – so the outcome is not guaranteed. It may well be that we have to settle for less than we have applied for in the first round, but we could then apply for further tranches of funding later on.

This substantial project will provide the opportunity to harness the latent skills and talents of many Ovingtonians. If you feel that you would like to help further, please let us know.
