In an emergency, if you suspect someone is having a heart attack, then you should DIAL 999 immediately. The emergency services will direct you to the defibrillator in the old phone box and give you the code to access the equipment, while an ambulance is summoned. You will then be talked through what to do next and the equipment itself will give clear instructions. Let us hope that it will not be needed, but having it centrally in the village should give us all peace of mind.

Heritage Lottery Funding: Church

It must all seem like a long time ago when we first applied for a Heritage Lottery Funding grant to do the work necessary to maintain the church and to fix its urgent structural problems.

Meetings have been held with the Diocesan Architects and Heritage England - who have been assessing our bid on the basis of the architectural needs. A photographer has visited from the HLF and generally more activity and dialogue between the PCC and the HLF gives us cautious optimism for a positive outcome in response to our third application for funding.

The outcomes may just miss this edition of the Oracle, but we are looking forward with some confidence to a substantial part of our claim being approved. If we are successful, the next stage will be approval and funding supplied for a development project to scope the entire project in some detail; obtain quotations for remedial repair work and develop the schools programme element of our proposal. (We have outline involvement from eight local schools and the plan is to get up to 2000 children to visit the church and get involved in researching a number of eco-, historical-, photographic-, and exhibition- projects).

The main infrastructure involvements will be ensuring the weatherproofing of the roof, repairs to the tower, fixing drainage and water goods and internal changes to the church – including moving of the font, cleaning & re-gilding the reredos, development of a sound system and potential broadband links to the village website - and to the schools involved. Photography to record the project in its various stages and the development and linking of a Heritage Trail are also envisaged – as is a time capsule to capture all this for posterity.

A key requirement to succeed with this project will be measured outcomes that demonstrate a wider involvement in the local community as a result of the HLF process – whether churchgoers or otherwise. Those who volunteered for the various support projects nearly two years ago will be approached again to see if they are still willing to be involved.

This is a massive project for our small village and the skills and experiences of many people will be required to make it all work.

What an opportunity this is to provide continuity for our historic church and to forge closer links within the village for future generations.
