#### Correspondence

Costs for emptying dog bins for those which do not come under the remit of Breckland District Council were received. Councillors will attempt to keep bins under the District Council scheme.

### **Church Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) Grant**

A presentation to the Council by John Hardy assisted by Chris Springford following the successful HLF application.

#### **Finance**

Payments were reviewed and cheques signed including grants to charitable organisations who provide a service to the village: Air Ambulance (£100), First Response (£100) CAB (£300), EACH (£100) Norfolk Accident Rescue (£100).

External Auditors report was reviewed with no issues of concern.

A preliminary assessment of the 2016/17 precept was considered.

It was noted that Norfolk County Council are considering charging for and requiring parishes to collect salt to refill roadside salt bins.

## Our community – Our church

In a letter dated 22 September 2015, we were advised of the successful outcome of our third bid to attract Heritage Lottery Funding (HLF) for our proposed project in Ovington. The news was announced as follows:

Congratulations, your application has now been assessed and I'm delighted to inform you that we have decided to award a first-round pass of up to £191,400, which represents 86% of total project costs of £222,006. I am also pleased to confirm that this includes a development grant of up to £27,000 (twenty seven thousand pounds) 85% of the total development work cost of £31,782 towards preparation of your second round submission.

A first-round pass means that we believe that your project has potential to deliver highquality outcomes and value for Lottery money.

The project is in three phases: start-up (where we are now), investigation and development of detailed plans to support these aims, followed by the work to implement the plans.

The work will all carry HLF branding under the banner of 'Our community – Our church', as a symbol of our intention to use the extensive skills inherent in the village to engage with a younger generation in gaining an understanding of the work of the church in the community.

This is a fantastic opportunity to capture the history and ecology of this place; connect the church with the village, diocese and world-wide church networks – while getting the church building in a good state for the next hundred years.

The initial feedback that we have from the village is of enthusiastic support for the project.

In addition to the HLF grant, some local fund-raising will be needed to help with those elements of the project not specifically covered in the grant. Offers to run concerts and other fund-raising initiatives are being developed to help with this.


