

## Our Community – Our Church

### A lot has happened in the Ovington Heritage Lottery Project:

At our Public Meeting in the village hall on Friday 11th March a good group of villagers were brought up to date with the overall progress of the project.

The Principal from the Heritage Lottery funding (that we report to) was surprised at the progress we had made, but warned us that because of official channels the project must follow, it may miss the June 23rd target but hit the September window. This may delay the start of the school projects by a couple of months.

The architect had been commissioned to instruct the various contractors and specialists involved in producing formal tenders to proceed; and detailed site investigations are due to take place either 11th-12th April or 19th-20th April. It is hoped when this process takes place, people in the village who are interested may be invited to see and learn about what is being restored. It is hoped the investigation keeps us within the original budgets, if not, further delays will be incurred.

Further discussion took place about the moving of the font and the removal of two pews - that had initially been agreed in a public meeting back in 2014. The feelings of the individuals that were not happy with this were respected, and they were assured that final decisions would be subject to the Diocesan faculty process. Faculties are published ahead of final decisions by the Diocesan Advisory Committee\* so that villagers have the opportunity to comment on proposed changes.

\*Note: DACs have existed since the 1920s to provide advice to parishes, the Chancellor and Archdeacons about church buildings and their contents and churchyards. FACULTIES (licences) are required for all repairs, alterations or additions to the churh and churchyard unless they are very minor items and listed as "de minimis". [Up-righting of the gravestones is an example of this].

Faculties are required in order to:

- a) Secure the long term interest of parishioners past, present and future.
- b) Prevent changes that are unnecessary or irreversible.
- c) Retain the exemption of ecclesiastical buildings from secular listed building control.

Good progress had been made with the Glebe Surveyor meeting the village hall committee and agreeing the boundaries and the issuing of licences.

A comprehensive summary of the school project was given, and it had reached the stage where the schools involved had been offered schedules for their one-day visits to the church and village hall over the next year. An extremely interesting programme was being constructed linked to the school curriculum taking in a very varied range of topics. We already have a good team coming together of qualified teachers and classroom assistants, but we need more. If you think you can help or you know somebody who can please contact us. It is going to be great fun. We will also need a supply of helpers to set up and take down technical classroom equipment on every visit

It was a well-received meeting and agreed that further public meetings would be held as progress is made and there is something to report back. The next Open Meeting will be at 12.00 noon on Sunday 24th April in the church – ahead of the Annual Parochial Church Meeting at 12.30pm – to explain the proposed internal changes.

A report of the meeting on 3 March, from notes and the unconfirmed minutes.

The <u>village web-site</u> is undergoing a significant update with Jeremy developing 'version 3' and a complete new section and extra facilities provided by students from Methwold School.

**Proposed 50 mph** speed limit for A1075: A response from Norfolk County Council (NCC) used accident statistics which differ greatly from PC local knowledge. Councillors requested a properly formulated evidence based response rather than using "setting a precedent" as grounds for rejecting the suggestions of the parish council. [Post meeting note: the officer working on the scheme has left NCC, it will be reallocated to another designer who has been asked to contact the PC.]

The **dog bin** outside the allotments is rusty, it was agreed to purchase a replacement plastic bin.
