# Our Community – Our Church

**WOW what a concert.** A capacity audience enjoyed pre-concert drinks outside on a beautiful summer's evening before going into St John's for a quite exceptional performance. The renowned soprano Emma Nuule sang well known popular pieces, and had to come back and give an encore for a very enthusiastic audience. The well entertained group helped to raise over £800.00 to assist the overall Heritage Lottery fund. It is planned to hold similar events over an extended period of time and they will be well published when arranged. We thank all those who contributed to make this such a memorable evening and an outstanding success.

The end of the Development stage. Chris Springford is extremely busy collating and preparing a massive amount of paperwork. This paperwork generated by the development stage of the project is required to satisfy the Heritage Lotteries very strict procedures. That stage involved closely inspecting the areas that the Heritage Lottery said they would fund repairs on. Closer examination shows the extent of the damage and what has to be done. The cost of the work to reinstate it to a satisfactory standard has been carried out and priced. It now appears that three areas have gone above the initial budget figures. The tower roof is in a worse state of repair than anticipated and needs new timber work and re-roofing. The large cracks visible above the south window beside the altar require a major amount of work on the external masonry. The Reredos now we are told can't be done by village residents but instead by specialised craftsmen which is extremely expensive and may have to be part of a separate project. The planned gilding course for 4 people is still included in this project. The final budgeted stage was submitted on 21 September for HLF approval, but in the meantime a lot of negotiation is going on to secure additional funds to allow the whole project to proceed.

Next month we should be able to report on the progress of our submission

# Parish Council (PC)

**Extra meeting:** 22 Sept, 2016 to consider two planning applications. This report is from the unconfirmed notes which will form the minutes.

**3PL/2016/1082/F** (Stonehouse Barn – conversion of outbuilding to accommodation)

Cllr Birt declared an interest as a direct neighbour and left the meeting. The PC has concerns about the clay lump building and over access, both for the neighbouring property and congestion during the work. Access being exacerbated by the proximity of a blind corner. There were are also conservation queries, clarity is required.

**3PN/2016/0068/UC**: (Rose Farm – change of use, agricultural units to three dwellings)

The PC felt the steel frame agricultural storage units appeared highly <u>un</u>suitable for conversion into dwellings. The detail of the proposed design is poor and not in keeping with the surrounding buildings.

The PC is very concerned about both vehicle and pedestrian safety. This road is a known accident black-spot. No local facilities are accessible except by car, turning out onto this particularly dangerous section of road. The PC believes this change of use is inappropriate, however if permission is granted the PC requests that it be on condition that a safe pedestrian route (trod) is created alongside the A1075 to reach Church Road.

The PC makes a response taking into account the village as a whole, however you may have personal comments about an application. Individuals are encouraged to respond via the planning portal:

On Tuesday, 20th September, 15 ladies enjoyed a very interesting talk from Stephen Pope of Gressenhall about 'The Agricultural Labourer in Norfolk' back in the 19th century. I don't think any of us realised what a hard time they had. They lived with their families in very cramped and less than basic conditions. They

worked between 12 and 14 hours a day, and longer in the summer months. They didn't have any holidays and only had a little time off at Easter and Christmas, although the ones who looked after animals still had to care for them. Their wage was about 10 to 12 shillings a week but out of this they had to pay rent to the farmer for their tied cottage. Very little was left for basic food and clothes. All the work on the land was done with horses so the labourer walked about 11 miles a day behind their horses. I think it was very thought provoking and made us realise how lucky we are to be living today and not back in those times!

The competition was won by Angela, with Mike's Spitfire.

Next month, on Tuesday 18th October, we shall be holding our AGM. Our Chairman, Rosemary, will be leaving the committee after her three-year stint and we thank her for all she has done.
