Great Progress

The schools project is enjoying a well deserved rest during the summer holidays having had about five hundred children through so far, and a further two hundred and fifty to come during the autumn term.

In the meantime a group of about forty-five made up of project helpers, their partners and residents of the village enjoyed and took part in the Project Open Village Meeting on Saturday 19 August. Initially project helpers were able to get their partners and village residents involved in some of the activities that the pupils do during their school's visit.

After lunch everybody was able to get a good insight into the progress of the restoration work being carried out on the church. The site manager of the renovation of the church Rob and his colleague Kelvin first described what they had done so far and what was to be done. Their total understanding of the original materials used in the building of the church and the original building practices used was apparent. They stressed that everything they were repairing was reinstating it as near as possible to its original construction.

Everybody received a detailed description of the repaired drainage system and the flint pointing that was taking place externally. Internally they saw how they had repaired major cracks in the walls, removed and replaced old timbers and repaired the tower roof. Kelvin showed how they made the putty used for the pointing, using original type materials to keep authenticity.

Everybody was impressed at the progress that was been made, and were even able to see some walls that had crumbled badly, now repaired and looking as good as new having had many coats of lime wash

At present everything indicates that the project is keeping to time with completion hopefully in November this year.

The flu vaccination provides the best protection against an unpredictable virus which infects many people and can cause serious illness and death each year.

- Children aged 2 to 8 years old*
- Pregnant women
- Anyone living with a long term medical condition
- Everyone over 65
- People with caring responsibilities

If there is someone you rely on to care for you, please ask them to contact their own GP Practice as they may be eligible for a free flu vaccination.

*Preschool children aged 2 to 3 years will be vaccinated at their general practice. Children aged 4 to 8 years will usually be vaccinated at school.


