Ovington has recently said its final farewell to one of its oldest residents with the passing and funeral of Don Webster, late of Crown Crescent. Don was a well known and popular figure in the Village, his ebullient greetings to all and sundry as he cycled through the V

greetings to all and sundry as he cycled through the Village will be long remembered. The display of Dahlias in his front garden were something to behold and added a splash of vibrant colour to the area.

Donald was preceded in death by his wife Joan, sisters: Irene and Ethel, brothers: Teddy, Dougie and Jack. He is survived by Doreen Thorpe, his children: Carol Grossman and David and he leaves five grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Donald served in WWII, landing at Normandy on D-day+3 and was wounded. He convalesced at home in England before being assigned to North Africa. He was assigned tours in Germany, North Africa and Malaysia.

Donald's army career spanned more than 20 years, earning and being awarded many medals including the Pingat Jasa of Malaysia and most recently the Legion D'Honneur from France.

The funeral was held at St. Peter and Paul Church, Carbrooke followed by burial in Ovington churchyard. In his memory please make donations to the Royal Norfolk Regiment or a cancer charity of your choice.

## **Working towards completion**

The weather has been kind to the progress of external restoration of St John the Evangelist Church. The tower is completed, the drains and soakaways are near completion which should rectify many of the historic problems with the Church. Covered scaffolding is allowing important roof work to now take place. Internally, the church is already beginning to look much improved, back to its former glory, with its lime washed walls the church is now a much brighter place. It is hoped, if funds will allow, to have the whole church painted internally. Unfortunately the church will not be completed by 3 November as originally planned as the company making the internal fittings have ceased trading. New craftsmen have been appointed, but we are assured it will be ready for the December Christmas Carol service.

The school project is now into its last term and everybody keeps pinching themselves about how successful it has been. It has been outstanding how a small community like Ovington and immediate surrounds have voluntarily administered a school curriculum that seven local schools and over 700 children have participated. Sorry helpers, it does not end there! All the schools who have participated are giving us a few children from each group in order to put on public performances. You will now become Thespians and will again be able to show how much these children have got out of their visits to Ovington in public performances next February.

We need to start thinking of the *Time Capsule*, ideas and contributions will be sought, watch this space for more information.

Initially it was hoped that villagers could be involved in the restoration of the Church Reredos, but this proved too difficult. However, I have heard various villagers' suggestions that something could be made for the church that will mark this point in its history. I will happily collate, and facilitate interested parties to meet and help them put together a project where materials and needle craft skills can be used to depict this point in the church's history.

#### Did you know ...

In the 17th & 18th centuries the people of the Parish were responsible for maintaining the main highway or turnpike road (now the A1075) where it passed through the parish. This was essential work to ensure the safe and speedy progress of the early mail and stage coaches on their journeys to the Capital and other important destinations.



Woe betide the unfortunate villagers if a coach should turn over, become bogged down or be snowed in. To facilitate the upkeep of this highway a pit was dug just north of the Watton brook and the materials from therein, stones, clay, gravel and hardcore etc were spread on the road surfaces damaged by the traffic or heavy rain. The pit was open to all so it is sure that all other tracks in the Village were also similarly maintained. The pit has since been filled in with municipal and domestic rubbish, but is still owned by the Parish Council.
