

It is with regret that I have to give up the recycling of steel and

aluminium cans for the benefit of the village hall. The prices for scrap metal have dropped so low that it is no longer worth the time spent sorting and bagging them, let alone taking them to the scrap dealer. When recycling first began a few years ago, we used to get about 1p per can – now it is 6p per kilo for steel and 20p for aluminium. So, a big thank you to all who collected their cans, but please now put them in your grey recycling bins.

With regard to the textile bank, if you see anyone emptying it at strange times into a strange vehicle, please contact me as soon as possible. There have been instances in Norfolk of gangs stealing textiles and the police would like to know about your suspicions. The regular dealer usually comes every fortnight on a Monday morning in a white transit van and, if you ask him, will show you his official ID Anyone else, using a private car, especially late in the evening, is probably up to no good!


