

#### St John's HLF project report

We had planned that the last part of the HLF project should include the repair and limewashing of the lower walls in the church to use up the remainder of the HLF grant. The cost of this exercise was greater than expected and the PCC decided that the cleaning and restoration of the reredos should be done instead.

This required a new faculty from the diocese and the selection of a DAC-approved conservator to do the work. On removing the reredos from the wall, it was apparent that the damp had crumbled the wall and damaged part of the rear of the reredos. An extensive repair and cleaning operation to the reredos ensued and the repair of the internal wall behind the altar involved several coats of plaster and limewashing to provide a suitable surface for new battens to support the reredos. These battens provide a space for air to circulate between the reredos and the wall. A generous financial contribution to this work was made by the Trustees of the RC Snelling Trust.

The conservation work established that part of the reredos was medieval (at the time it formed part of a chancel screen in the church) and some of it was skilfully restored in the Victorian era.

Replacing three pews with individual seats and then moving the font to the other side of the entrance door has created a more flexible space at the back of the church for after-service hospitality and as a space to hold meetings.

The vestry furniture was renewed to create better storage space for essential service needs.

Broadband internet connection in the church is now in-place – as is a hearing loop and projection and sound systems integrated with the organ. The addition of microphones has also helped.

A new professional history of the church was commissioned and together with a detailed report about the reredos and the story of the HLF restoration is being formed into a new A5 size booklet.

There were insufficient funds available to do the planned up-righting of the gravestones in the churchyard. However, the PCC might be able to secure funds for this from the Norfolk Churches Trust. The church grounds and the adjacent field have been repaired to recover the churn left by the building works and vehicles and the grass re-seeded and mowed.

We are also grateful to the HLF, the Diocesan Board of Finance, the DAC, the Archdeacon's office, the Architects and Builders, the seven cluster schools and village volunteers, and the many people who gave so generously of their time and money to help the project along.

We'd like to think that this has helped to preserve a unique village asset for the good of all. And, one that truly engaged 'Our Village with Our Church'.
