COVID-19 (Coronavirus Illness)



This is a serious pandemic and is a far greater threat than seasonal flu. Scientific information from reputable sources such as Imperial College suggests an infection rate of 2.6 which is twice that of flu and a mortality rate 20x greater than flu. One in five people infected will have a serious reaction.

Young people are not invincible, but the threat is greater to older people. As almost nobody has immunity, the only defence is to minimise spread and to achieve that requires everyone to take action. Failure to act may have serious consequences for you and other people.

We need to work together, please stay in contact with your friends and neighbours and continue to check on their health and needs. This is likely to turn into a dynamic situation where sometimes people can offer help and other times they may need help.

The Parish Council is bound by certain rules which limits the scope of what it can do, nevertheless all your Parish Councillors have volunteered as ordinary villagers to help where possible, especially for those who may not have family and friends close-by:

If your situation is medical or urgent phone 111 or 999

If you can offer help beyond family, friends and neighbours please give your contact details to any of the Parish Councillors above. Information will not be used for any purpose other than coordinating village help.

Guidance for volunteers:

- Generally, helpers should not enter a house and should stay <u>at</u> <u>least</u> 2m (6 feet) away from everyone else, minimise close contact time.
- Helpers may offer to fetch groceries or medication in which case it
 is safest to leave these at the front door, ring the bell and retire to a
 safe distance. Helpers can fetch medication and, with
 authorisation, prescriptions from the pharmacist, however they
 should not dispense medication.
- A helper may put bins out, but should not transfer waste from an inside bin to the wheelie bin. If this is unavoidable the bin contents should be double bag sealed and have been left for 72-hours.
- Both parties should wash hands after an exchange.

Symptoms:

The most common symptoms of COVID-19 are recent onset of:

- new continuous cough and/or
- high temperature, above 37.8°C

For most people it will be a mild illness.

Hand-washing and respiratory hygiene:

General principles to help prevent the spread of respiratory viruses:

- washing your hands more often with soap and water for at least 20-seconds or use a hand sanitiser when you get home or into work, when you blow your nose, sneeze or cough, eat or handle food
- · avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands
- avoid close contact with people who have symptoms
- cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in a bin and wash your hands
- clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces in the home

Guidance for anyone with symptoms:

- If you have symptoms of COVID-19, however mild, stay at home for 7-days from when your symptoms started. All other household members who remain well must stay at home and not leave the house for 14-days.
- Do not visit a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital.
- You do not need to contact 111 to tell them you're staying at home.
- If you feel you cannot cope with your symptoms at home, or your condition gets worse, or your symptoms do not get better after 7-days, then use the NHS 111 online service.

Cleaning and disposal of waste

- Use household detergents and bleach, as these are very effective at getting rid of the virus on surfaces. Clean frequently touched surfaces such as door handles, handrails, remote controls and table tops.
- Personal waste (such as used tissues) and disposable cleaning cloths can be stored securely within disposable rubbish bags.
 These bags should be placed into another bag, tied securely and kept separate from other waste. This should be put aside for at least 72-hours before being put in your usual external household waste bin.

Other household waste can be disposed of as normal.

Laundry

To minimise the possibility of dispersing virus through the air, do not shake dirty laundry.

Wash items as appropriate in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. All dirty laundry can be washed in the same load.

Last month's Logic Puzzle Answer:

31 bags each contain 50 coins. Only one bag contains valuable coins which weigh 10.01g whereas the other bags all contain worthless coins which weigh exactly 10.00g.

Since you were only allowed to make <u>one</u> weight measurement, you must take a sample which allows you to identify each bag individually. It is easier to imagine the solution if there are just three bags:

Take one coin from bag 1, two from bag 2 and three from bag 3. Put all six selected coins on the weighing scale (remember which is which because they need to go back into the correct bag). If the total weight is 60.01g, then only one coin is valuable, so bag 1 has the treasure. If they weigh 60.02g, two coins are valuable so bag 2 is treasure and if 60.03g then it is bag 3.
