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## Status:

The Government announced 'lock-down' will continue for another 3weeks, taking us to 8 May, it seems unlikely there will be any major changes ahead of a Bank Holiday weekend. It is logical to assume any relaxation of lock-down will be gradual while the effect is monitored.

Prof Chris Whitty, senior medical advisor to the Government, said it was important to be realistic and that "highly disruptive" social distancing would need to be in place for "really quite a long period of time".

The most important action individuals can take at the moment is to stay at home; washing your hands often – with soap and water for at least 20-seconds or use a hand sanitiser. Wash hands when you get home or to work, when you blow your nose, sneeze or cough, eat or handle food. Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

# Fraud and Scam Aware:

Unfortunately there are a minority who wish to exploit the current crisis for personal gain. The National Cyber Security Centre have taken down 471 fraudulent and fake online shops and almost 900 'advance-fee' fraud schemes.

It is best to assume **any and all** unsolicited requests for you to provide personal details or buy something or make an investment is suspect. Do not give out your bank details to someone you do not know.

## Guidance for volunteers:

- Generally, helpers should not enter a house and should stay <u>at</u> <u>least</u> 2m (6 feet) away from everyone else, minimise close contact time.
- Helpers may offer to fetch groceries or medication in which case it is safest to leave these at the front door, ring the bell and retire to a safe distance. Helpers can fetch medication and, with authorisation, prescriptions from the pharmacist, however they should not dispense medication.
- A helper may put bins out, but should not transfer waste from an inside bin to the wheelie bin. If this is unavoidable the bin contents should be double bag sealed and have been left for 72-hours.
- Both parties should wash hands after an exchange.

### Guidance for anyone with symptoms:

• If you have symptoms of COVID-19, no matter how mild (a new continuous cough and / or high temperature, above 37.8°C), stay at home for **7-days** from when your symptoms started.

All other household members who remain well must stay at home and not leave the house for **14-days**.

- Do **not** visit a GP surgery, pharmacy or hospital.
- You do not need to contact 111 to tell them you're staying at home.
- If you feel you cannot cope with your symptoms at home, or your condition gets worse, or your symptoms do not get better after 7-days, then use the NHS 111 online service.

#### Next meetings:


