COVID-19 (Coronavirus Illness)

After a summer respite the predicted 'second wave' of COVID-19 is upon some parts of the country. For a while Breckland was on enhanced 'watch-list' following an outbreak at Banham Poultry, but it was contained and we are no longer on the list.

Norfolk infection rates are relatively low, but it looks as if it will be some considerable time before we return to pre-COVID activities. The Prime Minster announced the latest measures would probably stay in place for the next six months, these include:

- People should work from home wherever possible.
- Pubs, bars and restaurants to close at 10:00pm and must operate table service only.
- Customers and staff in hospitality venues must wear face coverings, except when seated at a table to eat or drink.
- Customers in private hire vehicles and taxis must wear face coverings.
- Limit on guests at weddings reduced from 30 to 15.
- "Rule of six" now applies to indoor team sports.
- Fines for not following rules now £200 for a first offence.
- Plans to allow spectators to return to sporting events paused.

Ten intrepid Ovington cyclists set off on a "private" fund raising expedition to raise money for St John's Church during September. Taking their cue from the annual Norfolk Churches Trust Cycle Ride they adjusted a few of their normal cycle routes so as to include churches at Griston, Caston, Stow Bedon, Rocklands and finally Ovington. As several members had prior engagements later that day the cycle trip had to be capped to just a few hours.

Normally our routes are chosen to avoid roads with lots of traffic; on this route we did achieve that in the main but with the exception of some fast traffic on the Rocklands to Attleborough road, happily everybody stayed safe!! The weather was good for us; sunny but with a fresh breeze, and the scenery was very Norfolk with open fields, stunning blue skies and "fluffy" white clouds.

Our highly technical equipment measured the route at just under 20 miles which we all felt was a good distance given the short time of just a few hours. Sponsorship for our ride raised £70 for St John's the Evangelist Church, Ovington.

A report from the unconfirmed minutes of the 16 September meeting held via Zoom.

Councillors: Karen Weir (Chair) (KW), Tim Birt (TB), Dave Welsted (DW), Jeremy Woods (JW) and Pete Bate (PB) sends apologies.

Matters Arising

TB to speak to Chris Lewis about possible solution to stabilise erosion of the allotment entrance.

Correspondence

NCC parish partnership scheme is available again. [this is the scheme which helped pay for the trods]. No initial suggestions, but to be added to next agenda.

A proposed diversion of footpath 1 at Water End Farm was distributed before the meeting. Councillors noted that *The Ramblers* were not intending to dispute the change. The PC supports the diversion.

Planning

No new applications.

A replacement car port and art studio at *The Old Cart House* is approved. (3PL/2020/0686/HOU).

Accounts

Councillors agreed payments (full details on website) and reviewed our financial position relative to that predicted in the precept calculation.

COVID-19 issues

A message from the Norfolk Community Foundation asking the PC to consider returning any unused funds. It was agreed that as there is the significant likelihood of a second wave with possibly less support from Central Government, we will retain the ring-fenced funds. There was discussion around the use of funds for cases of hardship in the village resulting from the need to self isolate.

The General Power of Competence was adopted for a period of 12 months. This allows the PC greater flexibility to deal with any local issues which may arise from the pandemic.

Village issues

The hedge adjacent to the village sign needs cutting back; KW to action.

Posts of the 30mph signs in The Street are severely corroded; Clerk to report to Highways.

A couple of the new trees in Crown Crescent may not have survived the dry weather. JW and TB to review and report back.

Adjournment for public participation

The ditches are full of debris and need clearing; Clerk to contact landowners.

There have been further instances of fly-tipping; TB to forward Breckland Council reporting link to resident. TB said fly-tip reporting and clear up has much improved but he would follow up in a few days to make sure it had worked smoothly.

District Cllr Crane updated PC about the implications of the new Government Planning Consultation which is of significant concern to local villages due to increased housing requirements and reduction of affordable housing.
