# Gardener's Delight

Even some country folk have trouble telling a Rook from a Crow which is really easy, or as Dick Bagnall Oakley, the teacher and naturalist of the famous Greshams School, Holt, would have said 'If you see a great old flock of Crows then they are probably Rooks. And if you see a couple of Rooks fly over then they are Crows' which like to nest much lower down, often on their own, while Rooks prefer to nest in 'Rookeries'.

You can tell a Rook from a Crow by the whitish patch, bare of feathers, at the base of the bill. Whereas the crow has an all-black face. Persecuted for their love of grain and eggs it's often overlooked by the good they do by eating large numbers of Leatherjackets, Chafer Grubs, Cutworms, Wireworms and Mice, being able to swallow mice whole as well as Slugs and Snails.

# Ovington History – accident or ...?

Once upon a time there lived in Ovington a poultry farmer by the name of Herbert Bambridge. He lived on an eight acre farm with his wife, three daughters, a teenage son and a flock of white Aylesbury ducks together with some pigs and cows. His wife also kept the village shop.

In August 1953 ducks in one section of his farm started dying off in the dozens until he had lost some 400 to a mysterious disease. To add to his troubles Herbert had started to complain of pains in his stomach from early September 1953. A neighbour said that he said to him, 'I can taste those wretched ducks'.

On the morning of 18 September 1953 his wife was due to appear in court accused of receiving stolen cigarettes. Herbert was known to be awkward and stubborn but that morning he was unusually good tempered. He had complained about boiling pains in his stomach on the day before his death but had been eating prodigiously and, on the night before his death he had eaten a huge dinner of steak and kidney pudding.

At 7:20am Herbert had a cup of tea before having his breakfast and immediately collapsed into a chair. His wife said that he had looked pale and ill after drinking the tea. She then telephoned for a doctor who arrived about 15 minutes later, but Herbert died within a few seconds of him reaching his side.

His post mortem examination showed that he had a little over a grain of strychnine in his organs and the pathologist said that that indicated that he must have swallowed at least two grains. One grain in crystal form would have covered a thumbnail.

Herbert's wife said that she had taken out a £118 insurance policy on his life some time previously and added that she had had no indication that he was worried to the point of attempting suicide. She went on to say that it was not until after his death that she learned that he had taken out two additional £500 insurance policies.

At the inquest his wife said that Herbert kept a number of rat poisons about the house, saying 'He was very careless about them and would put them in silly places and then forget where they were. She added that when 'two fat pigs and a dog and a small pony died it was thought their deaths were from poison'.

The Coroner decided that there was no evidence of foul play.

Chris played a full part in the village for 42 years, being involved with the allotments, the Church, Parish Council, and more recently his cycling escapades.
