Curious history of the month of May.

Its origin is widely accepted to derive from 'Maia' the Greek goddess of spring. May was the third month of the ancient Roman calender, but Julius Caesar's reform moved January and February to the beginning of the year, therefore May moved from the third to the fifth month. Julius Caesar didn't quite get this right because <u>September</u> (sept being 7) <u>Oct</u>ober (oct being 8), <u>Nov</u>ember (nov being 9) and <u>Dec</u>ember (dec being 10) are all now in the wrong place!

Incidentally, there used to be Roman months "Quintilis (5) and Sextilis (6)

Local elections take place elsewhere in the County on 5 May but there are no standard timetabled elections in the Breckland area this time. Next year we will elect Parish, Town and District Councillors.

## **Privet Hawk Moth Caterpillars**

My first encounter with a privet Hawk Moth caterpillar was as a 7-8 year-old walking to Watton one early Saturday Summer Morning. Opposite Loch Lane was a large privet hedge on which was the biggest bright green caterpillar I had ever seen, with a large hook-like curved "sting" on one end. I managed to drop it into my bag, being careful not to touch its "sting," and came straight home. I need not have worried as that evening my father took me and the caterpillar to the local naturalist, "Mr George Jessop", who was able to identify it as a harmless Privet Hawk Moth Caterpillar. Many years later, when working on the large green Privet Hedge which ran the entire length of the school, caterpillars would be collected by the Deputy Head, Mr Bill Porter, and kept in large containers with a large pot of soil. After eating its fill of privet leaves it burrows into the soil in early autumn and

changes into a dark shelled torpedo shaped pupa, from which the moth emerges round about the following June. The pots of soil containing the pupa would be kept in a cool place all winter and would be brought into the classroom for the

winter and would be brought into the classroom for the children to watch the moths emerge to be released back onto the privet hedge.


## **Elephant Hawk Moth**

# Parish Council (PC)

Report based on the unconfirmed minutes of the 23 March meeting.

## **Matters Arising:**

Dog signs and trees have been given to the Allotment Association

## **Correspondence:**

Bures Farm Partnership have reported they have inspected the large Oak tree at the west end of The Street and confirmed it is not in a dangerous condition.

Norfolk Resilience Forum asked for interest in joining their emergency cascade alert system.

## **Planning:**

The PC objected to the retrospective application at Pole Barn, Dereham Road (3PL/2022/0085/HOU), primarily on the grounds of road safety, however it was approved by Breckland Council.

## **End-of-year donations:**

It was agreed to make a £250 contribution to Norfolk CAB and a £100 donation to the Village jubilee celebration from the 2022-23 budget.

#### Financial:

Payments and current financial position against budget were reviewed and agreed.

## Village & Highway issues:

- Fly tipping along The Street was cleared by JW.
- TB met with Matthew Lines, Highways Engineer who has arranged for the trod surface to be repaired and the culverts to be jetted.
- As the last arboriculturist survey was completed 3 years ago and another survey should be considered, Clerk to obtain a quote.
- Village litter pick is arranged. It was agreed that the Parish Council would pay the hall hire for this event.

#### **Public Participation:**

Written reports were received from County Councillor Bowes and DC Crane, available on the website. TB presented a verbal report:

In light of the cost of living crisis, opposition groups collectively proposed an amendment the Breckland budget which was confirmed by the Chief Financial Officer as being achievable within the proposed budget. It would have increased the *Household Support Fund*, provided an *Energy Efficiency Support Worker*, a *Food Waste Reduction Officer* and a contribution to provide a homeless shelter in the north of the District, but the amendment was defeated at an acrimonious meeting. The *General Purposes Committee* has been reformed, the effect on scrutiny will be reviewed by TB later.
