The village has recently finally lost its oldest apple tree!

This was a Norfolk Beefing tree, which has a long old history. The tree, located at the rear of the Old Crown, finally came down to earth, pushed by a tiny gust of wind. However, there was nothing really holding it up! It was a tall tree, planted at least a century and a half ago, but probably more. It has grown to the height of the house and produced large apples. The trunk was approximately 36 inches wide and over many years had become a home for squirrels and bees.

When two lots of bees left home, they were exported to Saham Toney, where they were given their own hives. The bees had pretty well eaten away most of the insides of the trunk, which weakened it greatly over many years!

The top part of the tree was broken off in a gale, in the 1990s. The trunk was then cut down in size to stop it hitting the house in a similar situation. So there was only about 20 feet left standing! This served as a large bird perch and a feeding platform!

In the end, the bottom of the tree was eaten away, with no strength left, but it had a long life!

Councillors: Karen Weir (KW, chair), Pete Bate (PB), Timothy Birt (TB), Dave Welsted (DW) and Jeremy Woods (JW).

Apologies: JW, District Councillor Helen Crane, County Councillor Claire Bowes.

Present: Clerk, KW, PB,TB, DW and 3 members of the public.

Matters Arising:

A painted copy of the village sign made from the original casting pattern was given to the PC by Mr & Mrs Sykes from Yorkshire. It is hoped that the Village Hall would look favourably on displaying it in the hall. DW to contact Village Hall committee.

Correspondence:

PC agreed to find out about the cost of acquiring and operating the 'ovington.gov.uk' domain. Councillors felt there was no urgency as grants may be available in the future if this becomes a requirement.

Planning:

Planning Applications:

3PL/2022/0290/DOC: Chanticleer, Annex, Dereham Road: Discharge of condition 3 on 3PL/2021/0241/F

Planning responses (submitted by Clerk under delegated powers):

3PL/2022/1039/HOU: 21 The Street – Single storey rear extension and associated alterations. Provision of air source heat pump and ground mounted solar PV. No comments submitted.

Planning Notifications:

3PL/2022/0901/F: Land at Water End Farm – demolition of holiday accommodation and erection of dwelling. REFUSED

3PL/2022/1039/HOU: 21 (above) APPROVED

Highways or Village Issues:

Norfolk County Council are aware that the roadway is sliding into the ditch at the western end of The Street. TB to contact our highways engineer and request a village walk around.

Financial Matters:

A donation of £150 was proposed for Norfolk CAB (who have an office in Watton), agreed.

Councillors reviewed and agreed payments to be made.

Future Business:

Precept calculations. Provisional data distributed for discussion at the next meeting.

Open Forum:

- Residents from North Ovington expressed concern over what may happen to newly purchased barns. PC to monitor any planning applications.
- An update on vehicle speeding was requested. TB said he had a
 battery and battery box but needed to wire it up and fit a securing
 chain to lock it before refitting the speed sign.
- TB (as District Councillor): Congratulated Cllr Helen Crane on her elevation with a full Breckland Cabinet portfolio. TB then gave a resume of his written report, the full version is available on the PC web-site. TB had sought the opinion of a Barrister over the proposal to sell Barnham Broom Golf Club following an unsolicited offer. The advice indicated that the Council's use of "Rule 12", which removes the normal scrutiny from the decision is not justified and there is insufficient information in the report to demonstrate the Council is achieving "best value". TB made detailed representation at a Breckland Council Cabinet meeting, but Cabinet agreed to the sale unanimously, delegating all further work to officers, without further Councillor input.

November saw the start of our talks programme, with Liz Ibbitson talking about the work of the RSPB with Little Terns.


