# Recipe(s) of the Month

### **Gill's Melting Moments**

Makes 16-20

- 40g soft butter/margarine
- 65g lard
- 85g caster sugar
- 1 egg yolk beaten
- Few drops vanilla extract
- 150g self raising flour
- Rolled oats for rolling and cherries for decorating

Preheat oven to 180°C/Gas 4. Beat together butter, lard and sugar, then gradually beat in egg yolk and vanilla. Sift flour and stir to make a soft dough. Roll into little balls and toss them with oats. Place on baking trays well spaced out and flatten slightly and put a piece of cherry on top. Cook for 15–20 minutes until lightly brown. Cool on trays then transfer to rack to completely cool. Enjoy!

#### Jill's Lemon Drizzle Cake

- 225 grams Butter or Vitalite
- 225 grams Sugar
- 3 large Eggs
- 225 grams Self raising flour
- 1 teaspoon Baking powder
- Grated zest of 1 lemon
- Drizzle topping
- 85 grams Sugar
- Juice of 1 lemon

Line and grease a 2lb loaf tin

Cream the fat and sugar together for a couple of minutes then add eggs one at a time until well mixed in.

Fold in the flour, baking powder and lemon zest.

Spoon into tin, level and bake for about 45–50 minutes at 160°C fan or 180°C convection oven until a skewer comes out clean.

Mix the lemon juice and sugar to make the Drizzle. Prick the top of the cake all over and then pour over the Drizzle while the cake is still warm. Leave to cool in the tin and then enjoy.





## News from Ovington Bees

Firstly, I must begin with an apology to all my neighbours who may have been visited by a swarm or two in the past few weeks. Fortunately, Barry has a keen eye quickly letting me know that the ladies had left their hive!

May is a classic time of year for swarms and this year has been exceptional with many swarm collectors running out of equipment

as they attempted to keep up with demand. Swarming is a natural process for bees who produce virgin queens. Following their birth, they generally flee the hive with 50% of the worker bees. If left to their own devices virgin queens can leave a beekeeper with a lot of empty hives and no honey!

So, beekeepers regularly check hives every 7 days looking out for 'queen cells' which the workers produce in large numbers.

As a method to prevent swarming, beekeepers will produce 'splits' where existing queens are moved to a new home (small hive or nuc). Generally, a queen will remain on her throne for 2 to 3 years. Once worker bees have realised that their old queen has gone, they feed a selected number of larvae royal jelly to produce a new one. Many of these queen cells are removed and destroyed by the beekeeper leaving two good quality cells. Essentially there can only be one ruler and after several days a new queen is born who will leave the hive to mate and hopefully return.

We're now into the 'June Gap' where food (nectar) is in short supply until summer flowers start to appear. During this time, we feed bees a sugar syrup to help them get through this period of meagre resources.

The spring honey crop has been taken off, uncapped frames have been spun and jarred. Spring usually produces a 'set honey' due to the abundance of rape seed crops in the area.

Our honey will be on sale at the Ovington Village Hall, Craft Fayre on 1st July or if you need it sooner just text Christine on 07530199910.

We have regular monthly walks: our short walk, of around four miles, is on the <u>first Friday</u> of the month. For those just beginning their walking experience on the second


<u>Tuesday</u> of the month we offer a walk of no more than two miles and on good and even surfaces.
