Heritage Open Days are back, with access to some places you can't normally go and free heritage open days access to sites that normally charge.



The **Autumn Equinox** is creeping up on us again, officially marking the start of autumn on 22 September at 1:43pm, unless you prefer the meteological definition in which case you start autumn 3 weeks earlier at the beginning of September.

The ridiculously precise time quoted is because the equinox is not defined by measuring day and night periods but rather as the time when the sun crosses the celestial equator which is an imaginary line in the sky above Earth's equator.



**Present:** Chair – Karen Weir, (KW), David Welsted (DW), Pete Bate (PB), Tim Birt (TB), and Jeremy Woods (JW)

**In Attendance:** The Clerk and members of the public from North Ovington

#### Planning:

To consider a response to planning application 3PN/2024/0025/UC; OVINGTON – Redundant Barn Rose Farm: Prior approval application for a proposed: Change of Use to an Agricultural building to 6no.residential dwelling (Use Class C3), ... Class Q

Councillors were concerned to see yet another planning application for this site, although they were generally supportive of additional housing. It was noted this is a "Class Q", <u>permitted development right</u> prior approval request, rather than a normal application (which would fall well outside the local development plan and would be very unlikely to get approval).

The chair suspended the meeting to allow public participation. On resumption Councillors agreed to add additional comments to the concerns they had already raised.

The <u>partial text</u> of the PC submission is available at the Breckland council planning portal. Point 7 – a procedural concern – has been redacted!

I am looking forward to meeting you all at our Harvest Festival service next month. Harvest Festival is a British tradition that goes back all the way to pagan times. It is celebrated on or close to the Sunday of the Harvest Moon – which is the full moon closest to the Autumn Equinox.

This means that usually, this holiday falls around the end of September, but it may also occur at the beginning of October in some years. The purpose of this holiday is to celebrate the food that the land has provided and to give thanks.

The Harvest Festival is a holiday that can be traced all the way back to the ancient Celts when it was celebrated as the seasonal midpoint. It was during this time that people would harvest their grains, store food away for later use, and begin preparations for winter.

It was during this time that it became customary to 'bless the bread', which would later become the tradition of giving thanks for a meal.

While some participants are trying to return this holiday to its pagan roots, most participants just see this holiday as a way to spend time with their families and to give thanks for the good fortune they have received all year long.
