Lady Day

25 March is Lady Day. That means in the first instance, the Day of our Lady, Mary. It marks what we call “the Annunciation”, Gabriel’s visit to Mary to tell her that she, by a miracle, would give birth to the Son of the Most High. (See Luke 1.26-38 for details.) But there was a time when it was even more important than that. Indeed, from 1155 to 1752 in England it was New Year’s Day. This in turn carries with it some memory of what 25 March meant in the early centuries of the Church. It was – we may say (I am not saying this phrase as such was used) – the Feast of All New Beginnings. It marked all that we call Holy Week and Easter (so Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Day), and the Ascension, and Pentecost as well. The idea that commemorating each of these moments of Jesus’ life and what followed from his death should be spread out over different days came later. At first, they were all marked as one.

Now, an additional point is that there was in Judaism the idea that a righteous person would live a perfectly rounded life. So they would die on their birthday, or just perhaps on the day of their conception. If you already believe that Jesus’ conception was miraculous, it is natural to focus on that. So it seemed we could deduce that Jesus was conceived on 25 March (which, remember, being Good Friday as well as the rest, is his death day).

These days, it is one of the Feasts of Mary, about which so much has been said, over the centuries. As I said in an earlier piece, Christians, it turns out, are very good at disagreeing. What Mary is famous for saying in the Annunciation is saying: “Behold the handmaid of the Lord. Be it unto me according to your word.” That can leave a feeling that Mary is meek and mild, timid even. But we don’t know her tone. I once heard someone say: “Mary said: YEEEEES”. And that YEEEEES was shouted as loudly as possible down the nave of Durham cathedral! We can see it as Mary at her most bold. I need hardly add: notice that she didn’t seek permission from any man!

We are now in the season of Lent. So what is Lent and what do we do in Lent, and why?

Lent is meant to be a time of repentance. These 40 days are set aside to praise and worship the Lord; to read the Bible more, and to pray more often. Christians who observe Lent

correctly anticipate deeper intimacy with the Lord.

Many Christians have heard of Lent, but do all know what it means? Is it really just a time of giving up chocolate or social media?

As many Christians marked the beginning of Lent this year on Wednesday, 18 February, known as Ash Wednesday, it's important to know the real purpose and meaning to the 40 days of Lent.

Lent is the 40-day period leading up to Easter, (excluding Sundays) that starts on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter.

The 40 days of Lent involve fasting, prayer, and alms giving as a way to connect deeper with God. Commonly observed by Roman Catholic, Eastern, and some Protestant churches, many use the 40 days of Lent as a time of personal reflection to prepare your heart and mind for Good Friday and Easter.
